Title: NEW YEAR, RENEWED LIFE, ECCLESIASTES 3:1-13 (Chatham, NJ; 01/04/15, AM) [Pc - Topical]

Theme: The beginning of another year can bring about some reflection on our faith as well as a renewed commitment to serving God.

Purpose: To help us reflect on the new year, the passing of time, and how we continue to be faithful to God's plan.

Introduction:

- 1. Have you made some New Year's resolutions yet?
- 2. How about some goals?
- 3. Or have you just paused to reflect on life and what the new year might bring?4. Psalm 90:12 urges us to "number our days," that is, to consider that with each passing year we know this life will end.
- 5. Without making any rash resolutions, today let's just consider a few things about our lives that will help guide our thoughts and actions throughout the year.

I. Reflect on the Seasons of Life

A. Ecclesiastes 3:1-8

- 1. First, there are some things humans can know about life by observation and
- 2. Experiences over a lifetime include a wide variety of opposing things, 2-8
- 3. This presents a cyclical view of life that affects all humanity.
- 4. We cannot control these seasons: our freedom is limited to some degree
- 5. We can control how we respond to them: this is the freedom God gives us.

B. Verses 9-13

- 1. Second, there are things we can't know about life: man can't know what God has done at the beginning nor will do at the end, 11
- 2. Yet there is a beauty in life that we can strive to see
- 3. There is also eternity in our hearts that drives our aspirations
- 4. Despite limitations to our sight and freedom, God has given gifts to enjoy, 13

C. Our lives can be fulfilling

- 1. Don't strive for exceptional living don't need to be the next American Idol
- 2. Strive for faithful living
- 3. What the world considers ordinary is probably the exceptional in God's eyes
- 4. You'll hear me talk about this from time to time this year

II. Strive to Discern the Hand of God

A. Psalm 147

- 1. God's sovereignty is highlighted along with his redemptive activity
- 2. Healing for his people, 2-3, 6
- 3. His power extends over the span of the universe, 4
- 4. Numerous verses reflect his provisions for food and his control of nature
- 5. He has revealed himself to his people, 19

B. Psalm 8

- 1. His majesty and splendor are extolled, even by little children
- 2. When the psalmist questions the role of man in contrast to the majesty of God, he realizes that God has elevated him
- 3. Jesus represents the highest achievement of humanity, Hebrews 2:5-9
- 4. By his grace mankind can be redeemed to be what he was meant to be

- C. Jeremiah 31:7-14
 - 1. The prophet gives Israel (and us) the hope of redemption: to return home
 - 2. The hand of God marks out the way that we can go home (our citizenship is in heaven, Phil. 3:19)
 - 3. Discerning the way home to God provides hope for any age
- III. Keep Eternity in Mind, Ecc. 3:11
 - A. Ephesians 1:1-14
 - 1. God had a plan from the foundation of the world, 4
 - 2. He determined to bring about a union of heaven and earth through Christ, 10
 - 3. Our inheritance awaits, 14
 - B. We have experienced the fullness of time, Ephesians 1:10 & Gal. 4:4
 - 1. This is the fulfillment of prophecy
 - 2. The plan of redemption has been completed
 - 3. This is the closing of one epoch and the opening of another
 - 4. We are living in and have experienced this momentous time
 - 5. Ecclesiastes does not and cannot account for this; only in this new age can we experience the hope of eternity that is in the hearts of humanity
 - C. Remember Jesus on the throne, Revelation 21:1-6
 - 1. All things are being made new, 5
 - 2. He gives from the spring of the water of life, 6

Conclusion:

- 1. Think about the seasons of your life; see the hand of God that gives you life and hope; always keep the hope of eternity alive within you.
- 2. Our wish for one another and for our community is John 20:30-31.
- 3. May you keep the hope of life near and dear to your hearts in the coming year!
