Title: A NEW CREATION, MARK 1:9-11

(Chatham, NJ; 01/11/15, AM) [D – Topical, Deductive]

Theme: Jesus led the way to the new life and a new creation by his submitting to baptism.

Purpose: To explain that baptism is a necessary step toward living a new life: by it we receive the Holy Spirit and come in contact with the saving, cleansing blood of Christ.

Introduction:

- 1. Jesus became a human in order to become a faithful high priest and to identify with humanity, Hebrews 2:14-18.
- 2. He also submitted to baptism to identify with us and to lead the way to becoming a new creation, hence, "to fulfill all righteousness."
- 3. This Christian rite of cleansing marks the time that a person passes from the old life to the new.
- I. Ordained by God: the Voice and the Dove, Mark 1:9-11
 - A. God's voice His delight and approval
 - 1. When God speaks, creation obeys, Genesis 1
 - 2. His voice thunders, Psalm 29
 - 3. His voice was heard also: Transfiguration ("Listen to him"); at the time Jesus was about to be glorified, John 12:28.
 - 4. Furthermore, when God speaks and we hear his voice, we must not refuse him, Hebrews 12:25-27.
 - B. The Dove: the presence and approval of the H. S.
 - 1. Why both the Spirit and the voice?
 - 2. An affirmation of God's presence among men?
 - 3. Like when the Spirit rested on the newly anointed David.
 - 4. Jesus was "Immanuel: God with us," Mt. 1:23
 - 5. These two witnesses leave no doubts about Jesus
 - 6. Jesus was ordained by God
 - 7. In addition, baptism is ordained as God's initiation rite
- II. Baptism: Where Man Meets God
 - A. Born of water and the spirit, John 3
 - 1. Man needs a spiritual rebirth, verses 3-6
 - 2. How to be "born of God" is this Gospel's message, 1:12-13
 - 3. This has nothing to do with natural birth: Nicodemus thinks it does and is confused by the thought
 - 4. But the birth involves water and the Spirit, a connection made in Acts 2:38
 - 5. Baptism is the physical act that God has ordained to be where we meet him
 - B. Identify with the death and resurrection of Christ, Romans 6:1-4
 - 1. The rite that demands a changed life, 1
 - 2. The burial in water symbolizes the death of Christ
 - 3. It means we die to the ways of sin
 - 4. Coming up out of the water symbolizes the resurrection
 - 5. It means we now live a new life
- III. Baptism: Not Something in Addition to Faith, but Rather an Act of Faith
 - A. Galatians 3:26-27, the Bible reveals an important parallel of faith with baptism
 - 1. We are sons of God by faith, 26

- 2. Without faith, there is no point in even discussing baptism or discipleship or obedience or most anything else
- We must believe that Jesus is ordained by the Father and by whom we are united with the Him
- 4. Yet Paul also says, "as many of you as were baptized have put on Christ," 27
- 5. Thus faith and baptism become a coordinated team to bring us into a relationship with God through the saving work of Christ
- 6. Those who have responded by believing in Jesus and submitting to baptism are Abraham's offspring and heirs according to the promise

B. 1 Peter 3:21

- 1. Baptism corresponds to the water of the flood that saved Noah and separated him from the judgment against sin
- 2. Noah saved from judgment by the flood; we are saved from it by baptism
- 3. "Now saves you" two experiences with this: Joe Lennon, evangelical pastor
- 4. Through the resurrection not just the water
- 5. Not a removal of dirt, but of a dirty conscience
- 6. Without the Spirit, it would be just a bath

Conclusion:

- 1. God has spoken through his Son, Hebrews 1:1-2.
- 2. His submission to baptism and God's witnesses to it ordain it as the means by which we appropriate the death, burial, and resurrection and receive the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Remember your confession, 1 Timothy 6:12 (and your baptism).
- 4. We are new creations 2 Corinthians 5:17.
- 5. Believe, repent, confess, and be baptized: still the tried and true means of coming to Christ, receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit, and being cleansed of your sins.
