Title: WHEN GOOD NEWS SOUNDS BAD, LUKE 4:21-30 (Chatham, NJ; 02/03/13, AM) [D – Narrative Analysis]

Theme: Jesus challenges the people of his hometown who don't have enough faith in him.

Purpose: To think about why some people get so angry at the Word of God.

Introduction:

- 1. This episode occurs in a much larger narrative of redemption.
- 2. It is a short story that doesn't necessarily resolve conflict as much as it reveals it.
- 3. Jesus announces that Isaiah's prophecy is being fulfilled by his presence.

I. Questions that Arise

- A. What seems to be the point of the story?
 - 1. Hometown folks don't accept a prophet
 - 2. Matthew 13:57 gives the same statement
 - 3. I suspect that the story goes deeper
- B. Why Begin with Confrontation?
 - 1. Jesus doesn't try to explain himself
 - 2. He confronts them
 - 3. Their words (22) betray skepticism
 - 4. He expects they will quote, "Physician..."
 - 5. Jesus has a knack for knowing the thoughts of the people (5:22; 6:8; 7:40, etc.)
- C. Why are they so angry?
 - 1. They were "filled with wrath" (28)
 - 2. Enough to want to kill Jesus

II. Who Believes and Who Doesn't

- A. Elijah and the widow of Zarephath
 - 1. Elijah prays for a famine on wicked Israel during the reign of Ahab and Jezebel
 - 2. He is told to go to Zarephath where he is fed for several years
 - 3. She is a foreigner, and God makes the oil and flour replenish daily
- B. Elisha and Naaman, the leper
 - 1. 2 Kings 5 tells the story
 - 2. Naaman hears about the prophet from a slave girl
 - 3. The king of Israel fails in his faith, 5-7
 - 4. Yet Namaan is healed and believes, 2 Kings 5:15-19
- C. Who believes
 - 1. In both cases God finds faith in foreigners
 - 2. The people of God, on the other hand, are faithless
 - 3. The centurion in Jesus day is another example, Mt. 8

III. Why Does Good News Sound Bad?

- A. Familiarity
 - 1. His hometown knew too much about him
 - 2. Was this also the case of Elijah and Elisha?
 - 3. Faithlessness characterized the nation in their time
- B. Self-deceived about their own lack of faith?

- 1. If you were to ask them if they believed, they likely would have said yes
- 2. Jesus sees through the lack of repentance of many Jews, Mt. 11:20-24
- 3. This is a general human problem as much as a people of God problem
- 4. Rapper Psy failed to admit fault (see photocopy)

C. Expectations of God

- 1. Perhaps people expect God to do more
- 2. Many atheists keep bringing up the argument that they are angry that God could let innocent people die (see article from NY Times, 1/6/13)
- 3. It is the same thing that Job tried to bring up
- 4. We want somebody to fix things
- 5. We can't accept that God won't fix them in our way
- 6. C. S. Lewis addressed this in "God in the Dock" article
- 7. If God passes our test, we'll believe

Conclusion:

- 1. Let us learn the hard lesson from Jesus' hometown: we must open our hearts to faith.
- 2. As people of faith, we must believe even against our own expectations; God doesn't always act according to our plan.
- 3. We must work out our salvation (Phil 2:12 -14) and do so without grumbling or complaining.
- 4. Remember the widow; remember Naaman; remember the Centurion.
- 5. Imitate their faith.
