Title: YOU ARE THE LIGHT (NOW, MORE THAN EVER), MATTHEW 5:13-16 (Chatham, NJ; 02/09/14, AM) [Pc – Topical]

Theme: God needs us to let our light shine as much, maybe more, now during this time of creeping and blatant darkness.

Purpose: To inspire the church to be the light despite the deep and slowly creeping darkness that pervades so much of our pop culture.

Introduction:

- 1. Audie Murphy's lone bravery and Congressional Medal of Honor award are described in the official report.
- 2. It is inspiring to hear of people who risk their lives to perform deeds of heroism and bravery.
- 3. True American idols are not entertainers; true idols are those who risk life and limb for a cause greater than themselves and for the sake of others.
- I. A Community of Salt and Light, Mt. 5:13 16
 - A. Direct address to the audience
 - 1. Jesus addresses the crowd (you) in verse 11.
 - 2. He describes persecution as an indication of God's presence within them.
 - 3. It provides the backdrop for his discussion of salt and light.
 - 4. He continues to address them in this next section.
 - B. You are salt, 13
 - 1. The audience is not simply urged to become these things; they are these things
 - 2. The challenge is not to lose their saltiness
 - 3. Salt serves numerous function: preserving, flavoring, and purifying
 - 4. Jesus probably has all these in mind: preventing decay, enhancing flavor, and killing various bacteria and viruses (sometimes it stings)
 - C. You are light, 14-16
 - 1. A world engulfed in the darkness of it sins, fears the light because its deeds are exposed, John 3:20
 - 2. Yet light provides direction and protection from danger
 - 3. It is a city on a hill, Phil. 2:15
 - 4. Not hidden under anything: gives light to all in the house (Mt.); that all who enter may see (Luke)
 - 5. Let it shine: good works, glorify God (a higher calling than self)
 - 6. The role of God's presence in the world has fallen to the community of his people, the church.
- II. The Righteous Ones, Psalm 112:1 "Blessed is the man"
 - A. Light dawns for him, 4-5
 - 1. His path is clear
 - 2. Characterized by mercy, righteousness, and generosity
 - 3. Conducts his affairs with justice
 - B. Not afraid of bad news, 7-8
 - 1. His heart is firm and steady
 - 2. He trusts in the Lord and will not be afraid (or at least won't give in to it)
 - 3. Eisenhower's attitude after an apparent defeat (see letter)
 - 4. Note how the numerous small squads saved the war at this point
 - 5. We will look in triumph upon our enemies, 8

- C. The wicked react to the righteous, 10
 - 1. He is angry at the righteous man; he gnashes his teeth
 - 2. Yet he will melt away and perish
 - 3. Such is the reaction of evil toward righteousness
 - 4. Remember that the backdrop of salt and light is the attacks of the wicked

III. The Light Can Open Their Eyes, 1 Cor. 2:1-16

- Paul has already explained that the wisdom of the world is not the same as the wisdom of God; God's is way above it
- His wisdom is "secret and hidden" (7) only to those who keep looking elsewhere
- God has revealed it to us, 10
- 16 We have the mind of Christ (the cross)
- Because we've been made privy to God's wisdom, we are the conduit by which it is communicated to others
- We are the light of the world

Conclusions:

- 1. We "shine as lights in the world" in the midst of crooked and depraved generation.
- 2. We must not cave in nor accept defeat.
- 3. In our small little corners of the world, we can be brave and perform great acts of light.
- 4. Commit yourself today to this task.
