Title: THE WHAT, WHY, AND HOW OF NEW LIFE, JOHN 3:1-17. (Chatham, NJ; 03/20/11, AM) [E – Topical, Q & A]

Theme: Consistent with John's them that Jesus offer eternal life, in this chapter Jesus presents the means by which we initially appropriate that new and everlasting life.

Purpose: To present and explain to the audience the what, why, and how of being born again to a new life and entering into the Kingdom of God.

### Introduction:

- 1. John's Gospel presents his readers the opportunity to obtain eternal life, John 20:30-31.
- 2. It is one of his predominant themes: 1:4 & 10:10.
- 3. For someone not always attuned to spiritual matters, this rings a strange bell, and he may ask what that is all about.
- 4. Perhaps some have heard the expression "born again" bandied about. Once again, this may be a peculiar concept.
- 5. In the mind of Jesus and John the ideas presented here are reasonable and consistent with the human condition and the teachings of the Bible.
- 6. Jesus speaks of being born again, the Kingdom of God, and the Holy Spirit.
- 7. Listen to Jesus as he talks with Nicodemus, who, though a teacher of Israel, doesn't comprehend it either.

### I. What?

- A. Jesus speaks on God's authority, 2. (Notice also that he re-enters the life of Christ in 7:50 & 19:39.)
  - 1. Nicodemus recognizes Jesus' right to speak on behalf of God.
  - 2. This Gospel makes it clear that Christ has this authority.
  - 3. Among other things, His miracles (John calls them signs) demonstrated it: 2:11, at Cana; 11:42-44, raising Lazarus.
  - 4. That Jesus conquered death certified it beyond doubt.

#### B. Born again.

- 1. One must be born again otherwise he cannot enter the Kingdom of God, 3.
- 2. First of all, his words seem like a *non sequitur*, a statement that doesn't follow from the previous statement.
- 3. Nicodemus doesn't understand the concept.
- 4. The Kingdom of God is not unfamiliar to him; it is part of Israel's hope.
- 5. The term confuses him, and he cannot understand how a person can be born after he has already been born.

# C. A spiritual birth.

- 1. Jesus explains that this is a birth accomplished by the Holy Spirit, 6-8.
- 2. It has nothing to do with physical birth.
- 3. The Gospel has already prepared us to see this, 1:12-13.
- 4. Later disciples will describe it in terms of putting off the old self (or dieing to the old ways of living) and putting on the new self. Ephesians 4:22-24.
- 5. It is a new life that lives for God and rejects the old ways of sin and depravity.
- 6. One dies and is resurrected to a new life, thus born again.

### II. Why?

- A. The need implied and explained.
  - 1. "Their deeds were evil," explains the condition of mankind, vs. 19.
  - 2. Christianity states that "all have sinned," Romans 3:23.
  - 3. All humanity has rebelled against God. (Emphasize.)

- 4. We need to have our sins atoned for and our guilt removed.
- 5. John describes Jesus as the "Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world," John 1:29.
- 6. At his birth (Mt. 1:21) his father learned that he will "save his people from their sins."

# B. We must turn from darkness to light.

- 1. This turn must occur if we are to appropriate eternal life and escape judgment.
- 2. All of us will face God one day, Hebrews 9:27.
- 3. A resurrection to life or to judgment, John 5:28-29.
- 4. Choosing Jesus now assures us of our direction in the next life, 3:16-18.
- 5. God sent his Son to give us eternal life and that we might not be condemned because of our sins.
- 6. Why do we need this? We are sinner who must turn back to God and receive forgiveness for our sins.

# III. How? By water and Spirit, verse 5.

# A. The Spirit is the Holy Spirit.

- 1. He touches us in mysterious fashion.
- 2. However, we know we've been touched by him when we are convicted of our sins, John 16:8.
- 3. This is the truth Jesus says we need to be set free, Jn. 8:32.
- 4. Belief in Christ (16) comes through his leading and power.
- 5. In Acts 2:37 Peter's message came through the power of the Holy Spirit and many who heard it were "cut to the heart," Acts 2:37.
- 6. It is the Holy Spirit who urges us to believe that Jesus is the Son of God who takes away our sin.

# B. Water

- 1. Perhaps water seems too mundane to be associated with this process that is a spiritual awakening.
- 2. However, it cannot be the water of physical birth because we already know that Jesus informs Nicodemus that he isn't talking about a physical birth.
- 3. The most prominent item involving water among John the Baptist's disciples, among Jesus' disciples, and in the early church is baptism.
- 4. Jesus commands his disciples to baptize people, Mt. 28:20.
- 5. Paul explains to one of the churches the meaning of it, Romans 6:3-4.
- 6. It is a death, burial, and resurrection.
- 7. We are born again when we are baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

# Conclusion:

- 1. This entire process has a spiritual depth that we can only scratch the surface of today.
- 2. However, there are simple steps you can take to appropriate it.
- 3. Believe that you are a sinner in need of forgiveness.
- 4. Believe that Jesus is the Son of God who can relieve you of this guilt.
- 5. Confess your belief that he is the Lord of your life and of all mankind.
- 6. Be baptized for the remission of your sins, Acts 2:38.
- 7. Live the rest of your life in faithfulness to that profession of faith.
