Title: FOR JUSTICE WITH LOVE, ROMANS 5:1-11 (Chatham, NJ; 03/23/14, AM) [D - Topical]

Theme: God's justice is a neglected but necessary item in the plan of salvation and in God's motivation for sending Christ.

Purpose: To examine the justice of God and to demonstrate its role in the Cross.

Introduction:

- 1. God's love prompted God to send his Son, John 3:16.
- 2. But it was God's justice that demanded a sacrifice, Romans 3:26 God is just and the
- 3. These two meet at the cross.4. They are held in perfect balance in the character of God, Exodus 34:6-7.
- 5. We have to understand both if we are to comprehend the nature of the cross.

I. Justice without Judgment

- A. Judgment is bad; justice is good
 - 1. Critics of Christianity often criticize the fact that there will be a judgment in which God consigns the wicked to an eternal place of torment.
 - 2. But if we posit that the notion of justice is a good thing, perhaps we gain a new perspective on it.
 - 3. See Keller, The Reason for God, 73
 - 4. I suspect our innate desire for justice drives some people to love seeing the bad guys in movies "get what's coming to them"
 - 5. Jesus' kingdom always had a strong foundation in justice, Isaiah 9:7 & 11:4
- B. Are people merely upset that God has drawn different lines of just behavior
 - 1. Ephesians 5:3-6, the wrath of God comes
 - 2. Revelation 21:8 the lake of fire prepared
 - 3. Are we upset that to us the punishment doesn't seem to fit the crime?
 - 4. Do we think that "nice" people should be accepted by a loving God?
 - 5. Yet if you have any innate sense of justice, you must agree that his judgment derives from his idea of justice
 - 6. Sin must be accounted for!
 - 7. You can't have justice without the idea of holding people accountable.
 - 8. Quote by Milosz in Keller, 75

II. Peace with God: Access (Romans 5:1-11)

- A. "All have sinned"
 - 1. Romans 1 3, esp. 3:23, all have sinned
 - 2. Colossians 1:21 alienated, hostile in mind, doing evil deeds: these describe us
 - 3. No one is exempt from this
- B. "Therefore . . . peace with God" (5:1)
 - 1. We are justified by faith through Christ
 - 2. God's justice has been satisfied by Christ's sacrifice
 - 3. Through the cross God has made himself the justifier of the justice that he demanded (3:26)
- C. We now have access to grace, 5:2
 - 1. In Hebrews 9 we learn that the temple only represented the presence of God, but when Jesus came he entered into the very throne of God in heaven by his blood

2. Hebrews 10:19 – we thus have the confidence to enter into this most holy place because we have been washed by his blood

III. Peace with God: the benefits

- A. We are justified, 5:1, 9-10
 - 1. Like a line of type: left, center, right, or both sides
 - 2. Justification lines us up with God
 - 3. Being justified is to be declared guiltless
 - 4. This comes not only from the justice of God but because of his mercy
 - 5. Christ died for us despite the fact that we are sinners, 6-8
- B. Reconciled and saved
 - 1. The barrier of sin has been removed
 - 2. Though once rebels and alienated from God, we have been reconciled to him
 - 3. This is all because of the Gospel: the death of his Son, 10

Conclusions:

- 1. Paul can speak of rejoicing (2 & 11).
- 2. He speaks also of enduring suffering and the positive results of it.
- 3. This is significant because it highlights the greatness of the justification that provides the foundation for the entire discussion here.
- 4. And so, let us rejoice at the thought that once we were enemies, but now we have been reconciled and justified.
- Once we understand this, we can see that it is just as powerful to think about as the love of God.
- 6. You are loved; now, be justified and reconciled.
