Title: THE IMPACT OF AN IDEAL, PHIL. 2:1-11 (Chatham, NJ; 04/13/14, AM) [D – Expository]

Theme: A lifestyle of service and humility is the impact and theological significance of Jesus' life, death, resurrection, and glorification.

Purpose: To remember the reason that we worship and serve God.

#### Introduction:

- 1. Jesus' death impacts us in many ways.
- 2. We receive atonement for sins.
- 3. The requirements of the law are met in us through Christ.
- 4. His resurrection assures us that we have everlasting life.
- 5. But it also impacts the way we live.

#### I. Have This Mind, 2:3-5

## A. A relationship dynamic

- 1. First, do nothing from rivalry or conceit
- 2. Christian living is not a game of one-upmanship; we don't seek to determine who is the best or most acceptable
- 3. Jealousy is at the root of this malady
- 4. Second, be humble; consider others better
- 5. "The smaller we are the more room God has," Doan, p. 127
- 6. "He who humbles himself will be exalted"
- 7. Third, look not only to your interests, but to the interests of others
- 8. Is there room in your life for others? Do you do things only out of self-interest?

#### B. The Mind of Christ

- 1. Paul wants them to be of one mind, 2
- 2. It is the mind of Christ that guides us, 5
- 3. We make his mind "ours"
- 4. It isn't the mind of society in general
- 5. Only Christians understand this

### II. He Made Himself Nothing, 7

## A. He set aside his God nature

- 1. "Not count equality with God" he disavowed the worship and respect that he deserved in order to meet us on our level
- 2. He got up from his throne and washed the feet of the disciples
- 3. He became a servant: "to give his life as a ransom" Mk. 10:45
- 4. Obedient to the point of death, 8

## B. On Form and Likeness

- 1. Form of God, form of a servant, human form
- 2. Form does not mean "in appearance only"
- 3. This somewhat vague Greek word takes on significance in Paul's theology
- 4. Implied in "not count equality with God" is that he was equal with God
- Essentially he was God; he was a servant; he was human (born in the likeness of humanity)
- 6. All of Scripture and tradition attests to these things

#### C. Characteristics of Christ

- 1. Humility he allowed himself to be humiliated on the cross
- 2. Service he spent his life ministering to others

3. That it was God who suffered and served makes this that much more profound

## III. Highly Exalted, 9-11

#### A. Name above all names

- 1. Jesus is the first of "he who humbles himself" and he gets exalted
- 2. Seated at the right hand of God, 1 Peter 3:22
- 3. Affirmed in Ephesians 1:20-23
- C. The Worship He Deserves, 10-11
  - 1. Every knee shall bow
  - 2. Every tongue confess
  - 3. "Jesus Christ is Lord"

# Conclusions:

- 1. The movement from humility to exaltation is a moral as well as theological imperative.
- 2. We are provided with the example in order for us to follow it.
- 3. Get rid of rivalry and conceit; put on humility and the mantle of a servant.
- 4. Follow Jesus in this way of life, and you will be exalted at the proper time.
- 5. Confess that Jesus is Lord now.
- 6. If you wait until the next life, it will be too late.
- 7. The Gospel demands that we humble ourselves before God, repent of our sins, believe that Christ is Lord, and accept his way of life.
