Title: GREAT THINGS, REVELATION 7:9-17 (Chatham, NJ; 04/21/13, AM) [D – Order of Climax]

Theme: War begins when the seals are opened; a great multitude endures the great tribulation; they worship God in heaven and on earth.

Purpose: To prepare us for the war and to exhort us to worship along with the host of heaven.

Introduction:

- 1. The images of chapters 4 & 5 remain in sight.
- 2. The Lamb, who is worshipped, opens the scroll.
- 3. Anticipation is at a fever pitch with anticipation.
- 4. The scene nonetheless continues to be dominated by worship.

I. The Lamb Opens the Seals

- A. The mysteries revealed (like a crowd awaiting their team to enter the stadium, and an announcer calls them forth; in this case the living creatures are the announcers)
 - 1. A white horse emerges, the rider carries a bow and wears a crown, he conquers
 - 2. A red horse gallops from the second seal, his rider wields a sword, he snatches peace from the earth, war and killing ensue
 - 3. Next is a black horse whose rider holds scales, exorbitant prices are listed for basic commodities indicating famine or war
 - 4. The progression from conqueror to warrior to famine and plague leads fittingly to a pale horse whose rider is death and who is followed by Hades
 - 5. The fifth seal reveals those who have given their lives (9), these martyrs cry out for justice (10-11)
 - 6. The sixth seal opens to sights and sounds of a great upheaval, similar to the language of Joel, Mt. 24:29-31
 - 7. We see an image of the end times: people running scared and God punishing their wickedness
 - 8. Heaven is at war with earth; God has launched his D-Day invasion

B. Four angels

- 1. They hold back the four winds that seem determined to damage and destroy
- 2. Another angel comes from the rising sun
- 3. He prevents the four angels from harming the saints

II. The Great Multitude and the Great Tribulation (a series of questions)

- A. Who are the 144,000?
 - 1. Probably not a literal number
 - 2. Since 12 is a complete number in biblical reckoning, this represents complete completeness
 - 3. The full number of Israel has been sealed, protected
- B. Who is the Great Multitude?
 - 1. They are without number
 - 2. Reminiscent of Abraham counting the stars and the sand
 - 3. From all over the earth
 - 4. Hold palm branches, clothed in white
 - 5. They praise the Lamb for his salvation
 - 6. These are the people who have come out of the great tribulation
 - 7. They've been washed and made white by the blood of the Lamb

C. What is the Great Tribulation?

- 1. Some might suggest a specific period of persecution and suffering
- 2. Mark 13:19 indicates a time of the destruction of Jerusalem
- 3. Since then the church has been through numerous persecutions, times of hostility, and periods of heresy
- 4. As individuals we are called to suffer with Christ (Rom. 8:16-17) and to endure to the end (Rev. 2:26)
- 5. It may be the entire end times in which we have lived since the coming of Christ

III. The Lamb Becomes the Shepherd (7:17)

- A. Heaven at worship again
 - 1. John, 1:10
 - 2. Heaven, chs. 4-5
 - 3. The multitudes, 7
 - 4. John finally commanded to "Worship God," 22:9
- B. Heaven and earth coincide in worship
 - 1. In worship we see the invisible heavens
 - 2. We participate with the heavenly beings
 - 3. All our activities grow out of worship
 - 4. It humbles us; it feeds us; it connects us

Conclusion:

- 1. The seventh seal silence for ½ hour
- 2. Can we heed the voice of Habakkuk 2:20? "The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him."
- 3. Is this also a prelude to battle?
- 4. Fire from the altar creates rumblings, lightening, and an earthquake.
- 5. God shakes the earth (Heb. 12:26-27) to bring about an unshakable kingdom.
- 6. Live for the time when our songs blend with the heavenly beings in worship.
- 7. Endure and conquer that you might be in the great multitude.
