Title: THE PRESENCE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT, JOHN 15:26-27 & 16:4-15 (Chatham, NJ; 05/27/12, AM) [D – Exegetical]

Theme: God is present in the church and with the Christian by the power and help of his Holy Spirit who lives within us.

Purpose: To provide a deeper understanding of the work of the Holy Spirit and to encourage us to recognize his power and presence.

Introduction:

- 1. The Holy Spirit is a distinct person of the Trinity.
- 2. Though symbolized as a dove or a flame of fire, he is not just an inanimate force but the living presence of God.
- 3. Though he can be drawn upon for strength and comfort, he cannot be manipulated for strictly human purposes.
- 4. Jesus defines his role.

I. He Bears Witness to Christ, John 15:26

- A. Peter and Cornelius, a case study, Acts 10
 - 1. Cornelius receives a vision, 3-8
 - 2. Peter receives a different one, 9-16
 - 3. The Spirit speaks to him, 19
 - 4. Peter eventually preaches the Gospel of Christ, 34-43
 - 5. That the Holy Spirit falls on Cornelius affirms the message, 44-48, and bears witness to Jesus
 - 6. In this entire episode, the Spirit has been active to witness to the Gospel
- B. Glorifies Christ, John 16:14
 - 1. The Holy Spirit does not reflect glory upon himself
 - 2. He takes what belongs to Jesus and declares that
 - 3. Perhaps this is why we know so little about him; he performs his work without reflecting on himself but on Christ
 - 4. However, we see the effects of his work, John 3:8.

II. He Convicts the World of Sin, John 16:8

- A. Felix, another case study, Acts 24:24-27
 - 1. Paul is in prison, and Felix, the governor, speaks to him frequently
 - 2. Felix already has an "accurate knowledge of the way," verse 22
 - 3. He and his Jewish wife come to hear Paul speak, 24
 - 4. Everything is fine up to self-control, righteousness, and judgment, 25
 - 5. For many these are the great stumbling blocks
 - 6. You can say all you want about faith, love, and good works, but these things put people off more than anything else: they demand change from us
 - 7. Not to mention Felix' ulterior motive: bribery
- B. The world resists judgment
 - 1. The Jews resisted Jesus' teaching that they were slaves to sin, Jn. 8:34.
 - 2. The men of Athens scoffed at the resurrection, but more importantly it represented judgment against sin and the need to repent, Acts 17:31
 - 3. That many non-religious types quote, "Judge not, etc." simply demonstrates that they resist any notion that they are sinners before God
 - 4. They prefer to take the teeth out of the demand for righteousness.
 - 5. It is the Holy Spirit's role to convict them.

III. He Will Guide You into All Truth, John 16:13

- A. Not speak on his own authority, 13
 - 1. Won't contradict what has been revealed
 - 2. "Hold to the teachings," 2 Thess. 2:15
 - 3. "The faith once delivered," Jude 3
 - 4. Certain doctrines and moral codes are perpetual; they don't change
 - 5. These are collected and maintained in the Bible
- B. Each generation affirms them.
 - 1. By constant practice we learn to distinguish good from evil, Heb. 5:14
 - 2. We are "trained in righteousness" by them, 2 Tim. 3:16
 - 3. Although he will grant us insight and wisdom, God will not speak to our hearts something different from these teachings

IV. He Will Help Us, John 15:26

- 2xs he is called the "Helper" (15:26 & 16:7)
- Also in 14:16 & 26; sometimes known as the advocate, counselor, or paraclete
- Jesus also is called our advocate for forgiveness in 1 John 2:1
- The Holy Spirit provides the strength and encouragement needed to live holy lives
- We know of one specific instance when the Holy Spirit helps us: prayer, Rom. 8:26-27
- His power and help is available to us

Conclusion:

- 1. When Israel struggled to rebuild after the captivity, there were many obstacles.
- 2. Zechariah 4:6 assured the leaders that the rebuilding would take place "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, says the Lord of hosts."
- 3. By God's power, by Christ's glory, and by the Spirit's help we will live out our lives in righteousness and holiness before God.
- 4. It is the Spirit of the living God who gives us the victory in Christ Jesus.
