Title: WEEDS, SEEDS, AND PEARLS, MATTHEW 13:36-43 & 44-46 (Chatham, NJ; 07/17/11, AM) [Pc – Narrative Analysis]

Theme: More parables of Jesus describe the presence of evil, the growth of the Kingdom, and the value of the Kingdom above all else.

Purpose: To encourage us to maintain our direction, to sustain our hope, and to place our value in the Kingdom of God.

Introduction:

- 1. Jesus tells more parables.
- 2. But let's not get caught up in the images; let's see what we can learn from them.
- 3. These are more allegories, and there are only representative characters, symbols of the types of people there are in the world.
- 4. The weeds, seeds, and pearls point to something bigger.
- I. Harvest Time Wheat and Weeds
 - A. Characters
 - 1. Sower: son of man
 - 2. Enemy: devil
 - 3. Field: world
 - 4. Good seed: children of the kingdom (not the Word)
 - 5. Weeds: sons of the evil one
 - 6. Harvest: close of the age
 - 7. Reapers: angels
 - B. Weeds and wheat separated
 - 1. Weeds destroyed: place of weeping, gnashing teeth
 - 2. Weeds are causes of sin and law-breakers
 - 3. Wheat gathered into barn: righteous shine like the sun in the Kingdom
 - C. Reward and punishment
 - 1. History coming to a close with judgment to follow
 - 2. A brief history of the world (good vs. evil as in Psalm 1) drawn in black and white
 - 3. Parable of Net is similar.
 - 4. Everyone must answer for their lives.
- II. Growth Mustard Seeds, Yeast
 - A. A small seed
 - 1. A small seed planted in a garden; don't fuss over what this seed was.
 - 2. When it matures, it provides a home for birds.
 - 3. The kingdom is like that small seed.
 - 4. Something small becomes a place of refuge.
 - 5. For David and other Psalmists God was a place of refuge.
 - B. Leaven yeast or some form of natural leavening agent.
 - 1. Small amount added to dough produces a risen dough.
 - 2. The yeast influences the entire loaf.
 - 3. The Kingdom's influence will be like that.
 - 4. It affects everything.
 - 5. See the quote from a Chinese scholar.
 - C. Nothing will prevail against the Kingdom, Mt. 16:18.
 - 1. It will grow and influence everything around it.

- 2. That it will conquer all other kingdoms gives Christians hope; God's history is on our side.
- 3. This is why we can be positive about the future.
- III. Value The Quest for Riches (Visions of Eden or Treasure Island)
 - A. Treasure in a field, 44
 - 1. A man finds a treasure.
 - 2. He buys the field.
 - 3. He sells all that he owns, and he rejoices.
 - 4. The treasure was worth everything else.
 - B. A pearl of great price, 45-46
 - 1. A merchant searches for the greatest of all pearls
 - 2. He buys one of great value by selling all he has.
 - 3. The pearl was that valuable.
 - C. Stories about what we really want and need.
 - 1. These items were costly but worth the price.
 - 2. The Kingdom of God is like them in that it is worth everything we have.
 - 3. Its value comes from redemption and redemption makes us better people not only for the future but in the here and now.

Conclusions:

- 1. What do these stories add to our lives?
- 2. I think they answer several key questions.
- 3. First, where are we going? The power of the first parable is its notion that time eventually comes to a conclusion. At the judgment God will separate evil from good. Are we ready for the final showdown?
- 4. Second, what keeps you going? That the Kingdom moves forward and grows, and despite setbacks, it provides hope. God's word will not return to him void.
- 5. Third, what is the most valuable thing to you? There is nothing greater in value than being a part of the Kingdom of God, both here and in eternity.
- 6. Remember the harvest, the growth of the Kingdom, and the value of the Kingdom.
- 7. They will guide your life.
