Title: TEMPTATION, FAITH, DUTY, LUKE 17:1-10. (Chatham, NJ; 10/03/10, AM) [Pd – Devotional]

Theme: Jesus discusses temptations, faith, and duty.

Purpose: To reflect on these issues in word and song.

Introduction:

- 1. Jesus approaches the end of his ministry; he nears Jerusalem.
- 2. Several miscellaneous items are addressed without parables.
- 3. Today we want to reflect on them, believe them, and live by them.
- I. Temptations: Have Realistic Expectations (1-4).
 - The first statement, "Temptations are sure to come," reminds us of Ben Franklin's axiom, "In this world, nothing can be said to be certain except death and taxes."
 - Temptations are a part of this sinful environment.
 - Although the Lord's Prayer asks God to lead us away from those things, we will always have conflict and sin to deal with in this life.
 - If your expectations are a life free from worry and conflict or if you keep hoping for such a time, you're expectations are not realistic.
 - Here Jesus emphasizes the perpetrators: "woe to the one through whom they come."
 - Punishment for tempting someone is severe.
 - "Beware!" "Be on your guard!" "Watch yourselves!" "Pay attention to yourselves!" These all translate 17:3. (also Luke 21:34)
 - Immediately he tells us how to deal with those who sin against us: rebuke and forgive.
 - Forgiveness must always be the response; it is the response that God always gives to us.
 - Temptation, sin, and conflict find their only proper resolution in the mercy of God.

- II. Faith: Raise Your Expectations (5-6).
 - What prompted the disciples' statement, "Increase our faith"?
 - Is it because of the teaching he has just given them?
 - However, this is a universal challenge for all Christians.
 - Jesus doesn't grant them their request; he tells them what to aim for.
 - Is he suggesting that their faith is small and thus chastising them for the smallness of their faith?
 - Is he telling them to raise their expectations?
 - Perhaps the task of being faithful seems daunting at times.
 - Yet we only need a small amount: the size of a seed.
 - That might just be the message; using the little faith you have might be more useful and powerful than you think.
 - You don't need to increase it just put it to work.

- III. Duty: Lower Your Expectations (7-10).
 - The servant's work is never done.
 - He comes in from the field and then must serve dinner to his master before he eats.
 - Does the servant receive thanks for what he is paid to do?
 - Likewise we must learn the value of saying, "We are unworthy servants."

- Romans 12:3 is consistent with the humility bred by the notion of being an unworthy servant.
- Furthermore doing our duty is no cause for pride.
- We are saved by grace, not by works; no one can boast before God, Eph. 2:8-9.
- It is actually comforting to know that I don't have to climb a spiritual ladder of success.
- Let's strive to do our duty and let God decide the rest.
- Humility is never out of place in the Christian community.
