Title: THE GREATEST COMMANDMENTS DO GREAT THINGS, MARK 12:28-34 (Chatham, NJ; 11/04/12, AM) [Pt – Topical]

Theme: Obeying God above all else bring about major changes in society.

Purpose: To demonstrate how obeying the first commandment brought about changes in pagan culture and ultimately conquered paganism, but to give warnings about ignoring these commandments today.

Introduction:

- 1. This scribe is a good one: to obey is better than all burnt offerings.
 - Hosea 6:6 I desire mercy not sacrifice
 - 1 Sam. 15:22 to obey is better than sacrifice
- 2. Obedience still counts for something.
- 3. Obeying God has far-reaching consequences: we may take it for granted, but our society is becoming increasingly unaware of the consequences of disobedience.
- I. Mercy was a pathology in many pagan philosophers but a virtue in Christianity.
 - A. The philosophers (E. A. Judge 1986, quoted in Stark, *Rise*, p. 212)
 - 1. Defects of character to be avoided by all rational men.
 - 2. Humans must "curb the impulse" because it is not governed by reason and is contrary to justice
 - 3. See quote on p. 212.
 - 4. This was the moral climate of the 1st century.
 - B. But Christianity...
 - 1. Mercy is a primary virtue, Mt. 5:7
 - 2. The new concept of Christianity: because God loves humanity we must love one another (2nd greatest command), also 1 John 3:16-18.
 - 3. Behavior demands were nothing new but God's love for humanity was new.
 - 4. Even more: the love demand extends beyond family and friends, Mt. 5:43-48
 - 5. Cyprian's quote, Stark 212.
 - 6. Not also his thesis, 211
 - 7. Obeying the 1st commandment change their whole outlook.
- II. Women/abortions/marriage/response to epidemics
 - A. Women and abortions
 - Letter from Hilarion to his wife (Stark, Rise 97) selective abortion is still
 prevalent
 - 2. Christians condemned all abortion and female infanticide
 - 3. Favorable view of women also seen in: condemnation of divorce, incest, adultery, and polygamy
 - 4. Christians also renounced the pagan double standard that demanded chastity in women but allowed sexual license in men (founder of Cosmopolitan took the opposite approach: men and women can both sleep around)
 - B. Hebrews 13:4 & Eph. 5:22-33 elevated and sanctified marriage
 - 1. Today marriage is under assault not just by homosexuals but by heterosexuals who see it as unnecessary or an encumbrance to personal fulfillment
 - 2. Propositions 9, "What's Missing from Our Middle Class Debate?"
 - 3. See the items marked in this newsletter.
 - 4. Loving God demands that we love the institution of marriage as He created it.
 - C. Response to epidemics

- 1. One in Athens in 431 BC and one in Alexandria 251 AD
- 2. Historian Thucydides described the epidemic in Athens: "many died with no one to look after them."
 - "men were indifferent to every rule of religion and law"
 - "no fear of gods or law of man had a restraining influence"
- 3. Similar pagan responses in Alexandria (Stark, Rise 83)
- 4. Christians responded differently, 82
- 5. They nursed many of the dying
- 6. Christian teachings of compassion, self-sacrifice, and care for people provided a "prescription for action"
- 7. The Christian way worked better
- 8. Christianity stressed love and charity (love of neighbor) as central duties of faith
- 9. These are sustained in everyday behavior

Conclusions:

- 1. Such crises and outlooks helped elevate Christianity and slowly topple paganism.
- 2. The two greatest commandments are the cornerstone of our faith.
- 3. God will judge those who do otherwise: often coming in the form of God letting whole societies simply go their own way, Romans 1:24, 26, 28.
- 4. Without the two commandments society will collapse under the weight of its own unrighteousness.
- 5. They have created a community of love and hope.
- 6. Don't take them for granted.
- 7. Let them continue to mold your life.
- 8. Love God; love your neighbor; it's that simple.
