Title: DESTRUCTION LEADS TO SALVATION, LUKE 21:5-19 (Chatham, NJ; 11/17/13, AM) [D – Exegesis]

Theme: Jesus predicts the fall of Jerusalem and tells his followers that salvation will come.

Purpose: To examine some of the details of Jerusalem's destruction, but also to remind the faithful that salvation will eventually deliver us from God's judgment.

Introduction:

- 1. Jesus predicts the coming destruction of Jerusalem.
- 2. It will symbolize the change from the old covenant and sacrificial system to the new covenant established by the blood of Christ.
- 3. This change will be accompanied by a great upheaval, but it will be followed by salvation for the faithful.
- 4. We still await the final consummation.

I. Destruction of Jerusalem

- A. The Disciples' Wide-Eyed Wonder, 5
 - 1. They comment on the majesty of the Temple (historian Tacitus called it "immensely opulent")
 - 2. Jesus had elevated the lowly widow (1-4) prior to this
 - 3. Their comments seem in stark contrast the poor widow versus the opulence of the Temple
 - 4. God values what man misses
 - 5. The Temple was to be destroyed
- B. The key to the timing of the events
 - 1. "These things must take place" 9
 - 2. These things refer to the destruction of Jerusalem, 21
 - 3. Remember that Jerusalem was destroyed once before in 587 BC
 - 4. It was a shock to Israel, but a remnant later returned
 - 5. This time there would be no return
 - 6. God's people (Christians) would be saved from his wrath
 - 7. "But the end is not yet," 9
 - 8. The end reaches much further out to Christ's second coming, 25-28
 - 9. We live in the intervening time
- II. People Will Hate You, 17 (this part fits all times)
 - A. The world hates the light, John 3:20
 - 1. And all who represent it, Mt. 5:11-12, 14
 - 2. A disciple is not above his master, if the world hated him it will hate us
 - 3. 2 Timothy 3:12 All who want to live a godly life will be persecuted
 - 4. Remember also 1 Peter 4:4 people malign you for not participating in their sinful ways
 - 5. In the midst of the destruction and mayhem, people look to blame others
 - B. What hatred and persecution looks like today
 - 1. Ad hominem attacks see "Liberal Squelching," p. 2 for quote by Lenin
 - 2. Also guilt by association quote by Party in 1943
 - 3. Intolerance of religion, p.3
 - 4. Lies, p. 3
 - 5. These are the same tools used by every evil movement in history
- III. Days of Vengeance/Days of Salvation

- A. Days of Vengeance, 22 God's wrath is coming, Eph. 5:6
 - 1. Historian Eusebius saw the destruction of Jerusalem as payment for their rejection of Christ and persecution of Christians
 - 2. Tradition has it that James, the writer of the epistle, was thrown from the Temple just prior to the siege of Jerusalem (the final straw?)
 - 3. The Christians fled to the city of Pella according to Jesus' advice, 21-22
 - 4. As with Sodom and Gomorrah there were no righteous ones left
 - 5. This was punishment for persistent unbelief just as in the Babylonian captivity
- B. Days of Salvation, 25-28
 - 1. Early and later theologians (Cyril, Ambrose, Augustine, Calvin) see this as the Second Coming of Christ
 - 2. This is probably the second prediction of verse 9.
 - 3. The destruction of those who reject God means salvation for us, 2 Thess. 2:5-8

Conclusions:

- 1. Romans 13:11 provides a noteworthy exhortation.
- 2. Though Jerusalem was destroyed, we are certain of a heavenly Jerusalem where God dwells with us.
- 3. We must endure the insults and mockery of this unrighteous generation.
- 4. We pray that God opens their eyes.
- 5. We have the hope of salvation and Christ's return as a pillar of faith within our hearts.
- 6. We call on our family, friends, and neighbors to heed the Gospel call to believe, repent, confess, and be baptized for the remission of our sins.
