Title: LUKE'S AFFIRMATIONS, LUKE 2:21-40

(Chatham, NJ; 12/28/14, AM) [E - Narrative Analysis]

Theme: In Luke's Gospel the events of Christ's early life affirm his divine calling and messianic mission.

Purpose: To demonstrate how both angels and the Holy Spirit demonstrated that Jesus was ordained by God.

Introduction:

- Luke's early record is filled with the testimonies of angels and eyewitnesses who
 essentially are people who have been led by the Holy Spirit.
- 2. In Luke these things demonstrate that Jesus has been ordained by God.
- Matthew uses Joseph's dreams and fulfilled prophecies to do the same thing: chapters one and two are full of these affirmations.
- 4. Both Gospels affirm what Peter says: we don't follow "cleverly devised myths."
- 5. Let's hear Luke's story.

I. Jesus Is Identified by Angels

A. At his conception

- 1. Mary visited by Gabriel, 1:26.
- 2. Zechariah's visit is by the same angel, 1:19
- 3. Gabriel "stands in the presence of God," apparently a high-ranking angel
- 4. We see him several times in Daniel, and he is only one of two angels named in the Bible.
- 5. He delivers significant messages to Zechariah and Mary.

B. At his birth

- 1. Angels announced his birth to shepherds, 2:9-14
- 2. They are joined by "a multitude of the heavenly host," 13
- 3. He is named by an angel, 1:31 & 2:21 (as was John the Baptist)
- 4. Jesus' identity is thus God-ordained (Mt. 1:21 "he will save people from their sins." BTW, it is an angel that appears to Joseph in his dream.)

II. Affirmed by Eyewitnesses – more importantly by the Holy Spirit

A. Simeon

- 1. Jesus presented to the Lord at the time of Mary's purification (his circumcision had already occurred in verse 21)
- 2. Simeon "righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel," 25
- 3. Isaiah 40:1; 51:3; 52:9 prophecies about Israel's consolation
- 4. ** "The Holy Spirit was upon him, " 25
- 5. God wanted Simeon to remain alive until salvation dawned upon the people
- 6. The Spirit prompts him to enter the Temple, 27
- 7. He took Jesus into his arms, 28 would you allow a stranger to hold your baby?
- 8. Something must have told Mary that this man was not a threat

B. Simeon's words

- 1. He thanks God that he can now go to his rest
- 2. For he has seen the salvation that God had prophesied: a light for the Gentiles and glory for Israel
- 3. His words come across filled with gratitude and joy
- 4. The child will create a stir (34-35): rise and fall of many, a sign that is spoken against, and trouble for Mary's soul; he'll reveal the hearts of many

C. Anna

- 1. A prophetess who lived a reverent life of prayer and fasting
- 2. She also came forward and spoke to "all who were waiting for the redemption of Jerusalem, 38
- 3. Was this a close circle of devout people?
- 4. As with those who spoke of John's birth, this must heighten their anticipation

III. Wisdom and God's Favor

- His physical growth is accompanied by the presence of God
- In several ways, the presence of God was seen in the next segment of Jesus' life
- He was filled with wisdom: wisdom came from God (Proverbs 3:5-7)
- This affirmed things that surrounded his early years
- In addition, "The favor of God was upon him," 40
- Favor is also the word translated "grace"
- For these first twelve years the presence of God is readily apparent
- The Temple experience will further affirm the wisdom and grace of God

Conclusions:

- 1. The prayers and faith of two devout people confirm the work of God in Christ.
- 2. That they were both moved by the Holy Spirit to express their witness coordinates with the angelic activity.
- 3. God had designed and approved Jesus from conception onward.
- 4. His baptism by John was just one of a long list of signs that confirmed Jesus.
- 5. We can be confident and rejoice that God has indeed demonstrated his salvation for all people.
- 6. Let it fill us with joy and assurance that God is still at work in Christ.
- 7. Believe in Jesus, repent, and be baptized: his salvation is for you.
