Title: REDEEMING THE TONGUE, JAMES 1:1-12 (Chatham, NJ; 09/13/15, AM) [S-P, Topical]

Theme: James' negative assessment of human speech must be tied to an even larger goal of learning how to use our tongue effectively and profitably.

Purpose: To learn how James' insights can lead to a more positive use of words.

## Introduction:

- 1. Speech is important to James (1:19, 26).
- 2. In 2:15-16 he addresses the problem of words not accompanied by action.
- 3. Words express emotion, thought, and aspirations.
- 4. They separate us from the rest of the animal kingdom who can't think in the abstract, communicate poetically, or reflect on the meaning of life.
- 5. Words make us able to do that.
- 6. Words carry meaning in ways that the literal expression may not: "Indian summer."
- 7. Both James and the Book of Proverbs warn us about using our speech for good, not evil.
- 8. This is not just an issue for Christians but for all mankind.

## I. Outline of Ideas, James 3:1-12

- A. The tongue steers the ship, 1-5
  - 1. First he warns the audience about the pitfalls of being a teacher, 1
  - 2. Like a small rudder, 4
  - 3. Where would a ship be without one of those?
  - 4. Today he might use the analogy of a car's steering wheel.
  - 5. Oddly, he provides the image of the perfect man, 2
  - 6. But the perfection begins with controlling the tongue: it leads to control over the rest of the body
  - 7. The tongue is a powerful little element of our human anatomy.
- B. A dangerous, deadly weapon, 5b-8
  - 1. "A fire . . . set on fire by hell" 6
  - 2. Full of unrighteousness
  - 3. A stain on the entire body
  - 4. Though some wild animals can be tamed, the tongue cannot
  - 5. It is restless and full of poison
  - 6. After reading all that, I feel afraid to open my mouth!!
- C. Look to the source to find the problem (Is this a hint of a solution?), 9-12
  - 1. Blessings and curses come from the same mouth: we bless God and curse people made in the image of God, 9
  - 2. His words could not be more ironic: blessing God while cursing his likeness
  - 3. Of figs, olives, and grapes: each cannot produce the other, 12
  - 4. The spring: fresh and salt water can't come from one source, 11
  - 5. A salt pond can't produce fresh water, 12
  - 6. The contradiction of these things makes the blessings and curses unnatural and even perverted
  - 7. By implication, the problem isn't the tongue but the source that fuels the tongue

## II. How to Redeem the Tongue

- A. Make the spring fresh
  - 1. James will discuss what's inside a person when he discusses God's wisdom versus the devil's wisdom in the next section
  - 2. Jesus addresses the problem in Matthew 12:33-37

- 3. Make the tree good if you want the fruit to be good, 33
- 4. The religious leaders were incapable of speaking good because there was so much evil in their hearts. 34
- 5. Here is the key: "out of the abundance of the heart, the mouth speaks," 34
- 6. A good person brings forth good; an evil person evil
- 7. Note also the power of judgment when it comes to our words, 37
- 8. Wisdom from God makes our inner man good, Proverbs 3:5-7
- 9. James 1:5 encourages his listeners to acquire it (portions of Proverbs 2:1-15)
- B. Practically speaking, we begin with "Be quick to listen," James 1:19
  - We might say, "Start the engine of your brain before you put your tongue in gear."
  - 2. Listen to the wisdom of God from the Book of Proverbs:
    - Without comment, there is great benefit in hearing these.
    - 10.19
    - 15:28
    - 16:23
    - 17:27-28
    - 18:13
    - 21:23
    - 29:20
- C. Bless, don't curse
  - 1. Notice three of the six things that God hates in Prov. 6:16-19: lying, false witnesses, and sowing discord all involve our tongue
  - 2. Blessing rather than cursing is implied by James and affirmed in 1 Peter 3:9-12 where he also affirms what kind of life God rewards
  - 3. Gracious and helpful speech encouraged by Paul in Ephesians 4:29 & Col. 4:6
  - 4. Wisdom from Proverbs tells us that words can do much good:
    - 10:11, 21, 31
    - 12:18
    - 15:1, 4
    - 16:24
    - 25:11-12, 15

## Conclusions:

- 1. Only the Gospel can cleanse our conscience of careless words: in baptism we are washed clean of sin.
- 2. Only the grace of God can sanctify the human heart and make changes in us.
- 3. Only the power of the Holy Spirit can lead us to use our words wisely.
