Title: THE GOD SIDE OF HISTORY, MARK 13:1 – 8 (Chatham, NJ: 11/15/15, AM) [E – Topical]

Theme: Those who like to talk about being on the right side of history most often ignore God's side of history: salvation history as climaxed in the cross of Christ and the Day of Judgment to come.

Purpose: To encourage my audience to think more about history as God describes it and where the destiny of this planet is headed.

Introduction:

- 1. History is in the hands of Christ: in Revelation 5 the Lamb is worthy to open the scrolls.
- 2. The flow of history is headed to a restoration and renewal of all things, Rom.8:20-24a.
- 3. Revelation 21:5 reflects the same dynamic.
- 4. A Day of Judgment will set all things right and begin anew, John 5:28-29, 2 Pet. 3:10-13.
- 5. God's history is a single drama played out in every nation, Acts 17:26-27
- 6. In Mark 13 Christ previews some of the changes that history holds, and he challenges the disciples' beliefs about the future. (Discuss)
- 7. For quite a long time Marxist philosophers have arrogantly proposed that their way of life in the inevitable flow of history.
- 8. When you hear people today suggest that people, especially us backwards Christians, get on the right side of history, they are echoing that false assertion.
- 9. It is usually meant to intimidate those who disagree or to make them feel like they will be left out.
- 10. Do not listen to them; they can no more tell us the future than flipping a coin can.
- 11. The God side of history is the only right one.
- 12. There are numerous camps when it comes to history as God reveals it.

I. The Rebel Side

- A. If not Marxism, something else
 - 1. The rebel side usually insists that it is the right side
 - 2. When people accuse you of being on the wrong side, it is usually because they see current trends and insist they will last
 - 3. Often their insistence is accompanied by rhetoric that sounds appealing: justice, fairness, tolerance, freedom, etc.

B. No place for God

- 1. Was it a surprise to anyone that at the 2012 Democratic National Convention the delegates sought to expunge any mention of God from their platform?
- 2. Psalm 2 addresses those nations and peoples who assume they can skirt God's plan for the Kingdom
- 3. 1-3: they set themselves against God
- 4. 4-6: God laughs; nothing will deter him
- 5. 10-12, he warns the nations
- 6. These are people who prefer history without God.
- 7. The old Soviet Union was honest about getting God out being atheists
- 8. And where is the Soviet Union today?
- 9. The rebel side, the one that ignores God, is the wrong side

II. The Runaway Side

- A. They agree with God somewhat, but just aren't ready to get in the flow
 - 1. There are a number of sub-groups here
 - 2. Maybe they don't disagree with God but won't make the commitment to it

- Maybe they want to agree but some unknown thing (emotional trauma, doubts, etc.) is holding them back
- 4. Maybe they've been brought up learning about God, but they have fallen away from it
- 5. Maybe they are just too busy to join in
- 6. Without trying they are sort of running away from the Kingdom; a non-decision is still a decision
- B. God's slow process: a blessing in disguise
 - 1. In 2 Peter 3:4 some people got tired of waiting for God's history to unfold
 - 2. Yet Peter defends the waiting and slowness as a reflection of God's patience, 9
 - 3. Mike Adams is a criminology professor at UNC Wilmington and a former atheist turned Christian
 - 4. He interviewed a prisoner who believed John 3:16, and it started him thinking
 - 5. He was also challenged on his pro-choice views by someone, and he called it the "stone in his shoe"
 - 6. After a long time thinking about it, he stopped running away and got on the right side of history

III. The Right Side

- Those who still believe that when we die, we must stand before the judgment seat of God. Hebrews 9:27
- Those saved from a corrupt generation, Acts 2:40
- Those whose most important goal is the salvation of their souls, 1 Peter 1:9
- Those who believe they will meet with Christ when he returns, 1 Thess. 4:17

Conclusion:

- 1. The death, burial, and resurrection of Christ were the definitive acts of salvation history.
- 2. The climax of history will occur when he returns to take the righteous to be with him and will reject the unrighteous.
- 3. Being faithful to the Gospel of Christ is the right side of history.
