Title: THE TIME IS NOW, MARK 1:14 - 20 (Chatham, NJ; 1/21/18, AM) [E – Topical: Then/Now Outline]

Theme: Christ's coming marked the fulfillment of God's promises to send a Messiah and establish his Kingdom on earth.

Purpose: To encourage the audience to repent and believe the good news.

Introduction:

- 1. The Gospel of Mark moves quickly from Jesus' baptism to the beginning of his work: he bypasses birth narratives and long discussions about John the Baptist.
- 2. These words represent what is most significant about the life of Christ.
- 3. The time is fulfilled; the Kingdom is at hand; repent and believe the good news.
- 4. We recognize the present application of these things as they apply to us.

The Time Is Fulfilled

- A. Jesus satisfies Israel's longing for salvation
 - 1. Psalm 62 David waits for salvation
 - 2. He expresses the longing inherent in the promises given to Israel
 - 3. Abraham's promise to be a blessing to all nations
 - 4. The Exodus and Moses' promise to send a prophet, Deuteronomy 18:15-18
 - 5. David's promise to have a man sit on his throne
 - 6. All are God's promises to Israel
 - 7. Christ claimed to fulfill them, for example Acts 3:22-26
- B. Now: post resurrection
 - 1. Salvation is offered to all mankind
 - 2. Reconciliation is given through the blood of Christ. Colossians 1:19-22
 - 3. This fulfills a deep, human, and sometimes inexpressible longing
 - 4. God made a promise to Adam and Eve to bring this about
 - 5. In Christ, God is setting the world right Revelation 21:5, "Behold, I am making all things new."

The Kingdom Is at Hand

- A. Breaking into human history
 - 1. God has intervened in numerous ways before this
 - 2. The Kingdom that Jesus announced was a fulfillment of the promise to David
 - 3. Israel expected a restoration of their greatness under David and Solomon: maybe domination of worldly governments and powers
 - 4. What were 5,000 men doing in Galilee in John 6:10?
 - 5. They sought to make him king "by force," 15 to stage a rebellion against Rome?
 - "At hand" but not "of this world," John 18:36 6.
 - 7. Though not of this world, certainly greater than this world and all its temporal powers
- B. Now: the Kingdom has come
 - 1. We are in the Kingdom, Col. 1:13-14
 - 2. He has made us into a Kingdom, Revelation 1:5
 - The kingdom of the world has become his Kingdom, Rev. 11:15
 Though not all have submitted to Him, Heb. 2:8

 - 5. The Kingdom is present in the church

Repent and Believe the Good News: Then and Now

A. Repent

- 1. All have sinned, Romans 3
- 2. In this regard, Jesus' message was the same as John's
- 3. The Parable of the Two Sons exemplifies what we must do, Mt. 21:28-32
- 4. We live somewhere between Christ understanding our weaknesses and him demanding us to change.
- B. Believe the Good News (Gospel)
 - 1. The message was about freedom from sin, the deliverance from sin, and overcoming the fear of death and judgment
 - 2. This is the culmination of many occasions that have demonstrated the love of God: consider Jonah 3:1-5, 10
 - 3. The death, burial, and resurrection of God's only Son reflects that love, John 3:16
 - 4. In faith we give our mental assent that it is true
 - 5. In faith we demonstrate our trust by obeying his commands
 - 6. In faith we hope for the eternal life to come

Conclusions:

- 1. The king is alive and well, and his kingdom continues to advance
- 2. Repent and believe the Gospel.
- 3. Begin your life in the Kingdom by being washed of your sins in baptism.
- 4. Jesus is coming back soon.
- 5. Don't wait until it is too late.
- 6. Respond today.
